Let's begin by making two templates that you can use over and over.

One for the HTML files and one for the CSS files.

Open Text Wrangler.

## Add the Document Declaration HTML, HEAD, and TITLE, elements. Link the css page in the head container.

This should look something like:




Next, create a Root Directory on your hard drive.

If code shows up in the browser window, something is wrong. More often than not, that something is a misspelled tag or a missing closing tag. Check your HTML page for spelling, closing tags, and brackets. This should prove worth your while.


Return to your plain-text-only software and the HTML page. Make any necessary corrections. Don't forget to close all tags except the <br> tag. Remember it doesn't need to be closed.

Save the changes to your page and return to your browser. Use the Refresh/Reload button in the browser to view your changes.

## Now let's add some style using css.

In TextWrangler, open the template.css and save as main.css into the \_css subdirectory.

Styling in css includes the name of the div, the argument (property) and the attribute (specifier) surrounded by curly brackets {}.



The style object is referred to as the argument and the specifier is referred to as the attribute or property.

A colon separates the argument from the attributes and a semi-colon separates the arguments and attributes from each other and quotes surround each attribute style.

We'll define the body background color, the h1-6 styles, the p style and a wrapper div style: The h1-h6 codes are header codes starting with h1 as the largest and dropping down to h6 as the smallest. Standard sizes for h1 and h2 sizes are 2.5 em and 1.875 em respectively but you can define these anyway you want.

Generally speaking, when writing a css page you want to start with the most important information first, such as body information then h1-h6, then p, the link information and then onto div information.

If you want to add a background image, use this:

if you just want to add a background color, use this:

We'll just use a background-color for now. Add the code with any background color you want. Remember you can get the rgb from Photoshop. The "a" in rgba callout refers to the transparency of the color. So 1 = 100%, .9 = 90%, .8 = 80% of the color and so on.

Save main.css.

Let's link the html page and the css page with code in the html page that recognizes the pathway to the css page:

k href="\_css/main.css" rel="stylesheet" type="text/css">

This goes in the head container below the title container:

Padding refers to the space inside of the box that gives a bit of distance between the box edge and the content.

Margin refers to the space outside of the box.
